Additional advantages of the programme

The Ph.D. in Human Rights and Peace Studies is a unique program where the developing discipline of human rights can be examined in relationship to theories of peace and conflict. While students may undertake research focusing on only one of the core areas (either human rights or peace), by completing the program the student will have a grounding in theory and practice of human rights and peace, and their interrelationship. Students in the program will gain a developed knowledge of current issues in human rights and peace studies, as will as an in depth knowledge of legal, philosophical, and political contexts to peace and human rights. The program involves 1 year of course work, followed by at least 18 months of research on the Ph.D. thesis.

Candidates in this program are expected to be highly motivated individuals who are capable of initiating and undertaking large research projects on their won. They are expected to have an advanced level of English, and be competent in political and social theory. Candidates should have completed an Masters degree or equivalent.

Candidates may undertake research in a wide variety of areas related to human rights and peace at the international, regional, or national level, but particular areas of expertise include:

- Thematic Human Rights issues (for example minority rights, child rights, economic rights, or the right to development)
- Emerging issues in human rights (for example media, governance, corruption, sexuality, religion, and conflict)
- Peace studies (for example non-violence, international relations and conflict, ethnic conflict, peace and conflict transformation)

- Internationally recognized journal(s) /publication(s) (required for PhD by Research Only Plan)
- Two (2) recent photographs (1x1 inch in size)
- A copy of an applicant's degree certificate or a letter of graduation certification (for an applicant with a degree completion)
- A letter certifying that an applicant is currently in the last semester prior to graduation (for an applicant seeking for a degree)
- A detailed transcript of a degree (for an applicant with a degree completion)
- A grade report with course names and grades received from the first to the current semester prior to graduation
- A copy of identification card
- A copy of house registration certification
- A copy of Certificate of English proficiency: IELTS / TOEFL INTERNET BASED / TOEFL ITP
- A copy of proof of Application fee payment.
